OSI AND THE BALTIMORE COMMUNITY FELLOWSHIPS PROGRAM

The Open Society Institute-Baltimore launched the Community Fellowships program in 1998 and continues to build this program as an ongoing resource for Baltimore. OSI-Baltimore was started in 1998 by philanthropist George Soros as a means to better understand and solve the most intractable problems

facing urban America. OSI-Baltimore focuses its work exclusively on the root causes of three intertwined problems — drug addiction, an over-reliance on incarceration, and the obstacles that keep youth from succeeding inside and outside of the classroom.

OSI-Baltimore also sponsors the Baltimore Community Fellows who work to create opportunity and bring justice to the city's most underserved.

has been working to improve life in Baltimore's underserved communities since 1998. Now 210 individuals strong, they are a corps of social entrepreneurs working throughout our city—one sees their imprint everywhere.

BALTIMORE COMMUNITY FELLOWSHIPS PROGRAM

THE PROGRAM

The Open Society Institute-Baltimore launched the Community Fellowships Program in 1998. The program seeks dynamic activists and social entrepreneurs interested in implementing projects that address problems in underserved communities in Baltimore City. It is now a corps of social innovators 210 strong. The goals of these fellowships are to encourage public and community service careers, expand the number of mentors and role models available to youth in inner-city neighborhoods, and promote entrepreneurial initiatives that empower communities to increase opportunities and improve the quality of life for their residents.

This year, up to 12 individuals will be awarded a Baltimore Community Fellowship to implement innovative projects that seek to improve the circumstances and capacity of an underserved community in Baltimore City. Applicants may apply for a fellowship to work under the auspices of a nonprofit organization in Baltimore City, or to work independently.

Applicants may come from all walks of life, including—but not limited to—business management, the arts, law, public health, education, architecture, and engineering. Individuals from underserved communities and people of color are strongly encouraged to apply.

FELLOWSHIP

Fellowship awards are in the amount of \$60,000 for a term of 18 months.

The Fellowship grant is intended to provide a living stipend to support an individual's full-time, independent work on a project. It is awarded directly to an individual to guarantee flexibility in carrying out the objectives of the project.

Other entities may augment the stipend. The Baltimore Community Fellowships Program provides limited relief for graduate school debt payments on a case-by-case basis. The program contributes to the cost of medical insurance for the individual.

ADDICTION AND HEALTH EQUITY FELLOWS

Beginning in 2020, up to two fellows, with a demonstrated interest in addressing issues related to substance use and addiction will be designated as Addiction and Health Equity Fellows (AHE). Preference will be given to applicants with lived experience of drug use and addiction and those whose proposed work intersects multiple marginalized groups (e.g., substance use policy impacting LGBTQ+ communities, or homeless individuals or people with disabilities). Projects do not need to align with current Addiction and Health Equity Program grantmaking priorities, but should be working to address some unmet need related to drug use in Baltimore City.

The Addiction and Health Equity Program's mission is to generate and promote innovative ideas that improve health equity and lower the threshold to high-quality behavioral health services, reduce stigma, and support community engagement to improve public health in Baltimore through advocacy at the local or state level

ELIGIBILITY

The Fellowships Program solicits proposals that address a wide range of issues, needs, and solutions. Applicants need not be from Baltimore City, but should be knowledgeable about social and economic justice issues affecting Baltimore's communities.

Individuals currently receiving wages or a salary to undertake the proposed project are not eligible to apply. Fellows may not use stipends to supplant funding for activities or projects that are fully funded and are being implemented with the full support of a non-profit organization. The program **does not** award fellowships to conduct research or to implement lobbying initiatives. Fellows **must be** willing to participate fully in meetings scheduled for the Community Fellows.

LETTER OF INQUIRY

Interested applicants will submit letters of inquiry according to the specifications on page 3, and OSI-Baltimore will select a handful of applicants to submit full proposals. Program staff and independent readers, as well as a selection committee comprised of local community leaders, review the proposals. The selection committee interviews approximately 20 semi-finalists and recommends up to 10 fellows.

To be considered for a fellowship, the 20 semi-finalists **must** attend the interview session with selection committee members. Selection is based on:

- The applicant's competence in and commitment to his or her chosen field
- The need for the proposed project or technical assistance
- The responsiveness of the project to the community involved
- The capacity of the individual to implement the project
- A sound implementation, governance, and sustainability plan

All information submitted to OSI-Baltimore is confidential.

TIME FRAME

All letters of inquiry are due by **Monday, March 16, 2020.** Applicants will be notified of their application status in May 2020. OSI will invite applicants chosen for further consideration to develop a more detailed proposal. It will outline details/steps in the process for the selected applicants at that time. Fellowships begin in November 2020.

I. COVERSHEET

This should be the first page of the letter of inquiry (see page 4).

II. LETTER OF INQUIRY

This should be no more than three pages, double-spaced in 12-point type, on white paper. The letter should begin with a one-sentence description of the proposed fellowship project that states the goals and the means the applicant will use to attain the goals. The letter of inquiry should describe:

- 1. Where the project will take place;
- 2. The social or economic need for and the anticipated impact of the proposed project;
- 3. The applicant's past experience with the targeted Baltimore community;
- 4. Why the proposed work is important to the applicant and to the community;
- 5. How the applicant will accomplish the goals of the project; and
- 6. How the project will stimulate social change.

III. APPLICANT'S RESUME

Please submit your resume or CV.

Janet Glover-Kerkvliet will establish the *Baltimore Job Hunters Support Group (BJHSG)* to support the long-term un(der)employed. The initiative will assist job seekers with the social, emotional, and psychological pain associated with mid-career job loss through counseling, coaching, information/referral, networking and outreach.

Damien A. Haussling

Damien Haussling will develop the *Baltimore* Furniture Bank to connect low-income individuals and families to much needed gently used furniture and other household items by working with case managers, social workers and similar professionals.



Marvin L. Hayes

In partnership with the Baltimore Compost Collective, Marvin Hayes will grow the number of youth in the Brooklyn/Curtis Bay neighborhood trained in the science and art of community composting as a non-burn waste diversion strategy –"learn so we don't have to burn." The initiative will evolve to include other neighborhoods throughout the city.



Kanav Kathuria

Kanav Kathuria will establish the Farm to Prison Project as a means to address the public health crisis regarding food conditions in prisons. The initiative seeks to improve all aspects of food served in correctional facilities and build alternatives to exploitive practices by food service companies.



Alphonso Mayo

Using the intergenerational mentoring near-to-peer model, Alphonso Mayo will establish *Mentoring Mentors* as a vehicle to establish long-term mentoring relationships with African-American youth ages 12-18. The initiative will help youth with social and emotional development, physical wellness, as well as improve literacy and life skills.

Through a series of educational workshops and parent engagement, Dinorah Olmos will establish La Escuela, sus Hijos y Usted: Empowering Latino Parents to Support Student Success as an initiative designed to educate, empower, and inspire Spanish speaking Latino parents to effectively engage in the parent-school community.



Mariah S. Pratt Bonkowski

Mariah Pratt Bonkowski will establish *PoP Pantries* (micro pantries) to combat food instability and hygiene poverty by increasing access to emergency food and hygiene items for families in need.



Ana Rodney

Ana Rodney will establish *MOMCares* as an initiative to provide prenatal and postpartum Doula services to African-American low-income women navigating high-risk pregnancy or with a child involved in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU).



Kendra Summers

To address the need of housing instability for Spanish speaking residents in the Brooklyn/ Curtis Bay community, Kendra Summers will establish *Casa Amable (kind home)* as an initiative to support emergency housing services, promote long-term stable housing, and help Latinx residents learn tenants' rights through a housing-based ESOL curriculum.
