

THE BALTIMORE COMMUNITY FELLOWSHIPS PROGRAM

has been working to improve life in Baltimore's underserved communities since 1998. Now 190 individuals strong, they are a corps of social entrepreneurs working throughout our city one sees their imprint everywhere.

BALTIMORE COMMUNITY FELLOWSHIPS PROGRAM

THE PROGRAM

The Open Society Institute-Baltimore launched the Community Fellowships Program in 1998. The program seeks dynamic activists and social entrepreneurs interested in implementing projects that address problems in underserved communities in Baltimore City. It is now a corps of social innovators 190 strong. The goals of these fellowships are to encourage public and community service careers, expand the number of mentors and role models available to youth in inner-city neighborhoods, and promote entrepreneurial initiatives that empower communities to increase opportunities and improve the quality of life for their residents.

Each year, up to 10 individuals are awarded a Baltimore Community Fellowship to implement innovative projects that seek to improve the circumstances and capacity of an underserved community in Baltimore City. Applicants may apply for a fellowship to work under the auspices of a nonprofit organization in Baltimore City, or to work independently.

Applicants may come from all walks of life, including—but not limited to—business management, the arts, law, public health, education, architecture, and engineering. Individuals from underserved communities and people of color are strongly encouraged to apply.

FELLOWSHIP

Fellowship awards are in the amount of \$60,000 for a term of 18 months.

The Fellowship grant is intended to provide a living stipend to support an individual's full-time, independent work on a project. It is awarded directly to an individual—or an organization on an individual's behalf—to guarantee flexibility in carrying out the objectives of the project.

Other entities may augment the stipend. The Baltimore Community Fellowships Program provides limited relief for graduate school debt payments on a case-by-case basis. The program also reimburses the individual for the cost of medical insurance, if necessary.

ELIGIBILITY

The Fellowships Program solicits proposals that address a wide range of issues, needs, and solutions. Applicants need not be from Baltimore City, but should be knowledgeable about social and economic justice issues affecting Baltimore's communities.

Individuals currently receiving wages or a salary to undertake the proposed project are not eligible to apply. Fellows may not use stipends to supplant funding for activities or projects that are fully funded and are being implemented with the full support of a non-profit organization. The program **does not** award fellowships to conduct research or to implement lobbying initiatives. Fellows **must be** willing to participate fully in meetings scheduled for the Community Fellows.

LETTER OF INQUIRY

Interested applicants will submit letters of inquiry according to the specifications on page 3, and OSI-Baltimore will select a handful of applicants to submit full proposals. Program staff and independent readers, as well as a selection committee comprised of local community leaders, review the proposals. The selection committee interviews approximately 20 semi-finalists and recommends up to 10 fellows.

To be considered for a fellowship, the 20 semi-finalists **must** attend the interview session with selection committee members. Selection is based on:

- The applicant's competence in and commitment to his or her chosen field
- The need for the proposed project or technical assistance
- The responsiveness of the project to the community involved
- The capacity of the individual and host organization to implement the project
- A sound implementation, governance, and sustainability plan

All information submitted to OSI-Baltimore is confidential.

TIME FRAME

All letters of inquiry are due by **Monday, March 5, 2018.** Applicants will be notified of their application status in May 2017. OSI will invite applicants chosen for further consideration to develop a more detailed proposal. It will outline details/steps in the process for the selected applicants at that time. Fellowships begin in November 2017.

APPLICATION PROCESS

I. COVERSHEET

This should be the first page of the letter of inquiry (see page 4).

II. LETTER OF INQUIRY

This should be no more than three pages, double-spaced in 12-point type, on white paper. The letter should begin with a one-sentence description of the proposed fellowship project that states the goals and the means the applicant will use to attain the goals. The letter of inquiry should describe:

- 1. Where the project will take place;
- 2. The social or economic need for and the anticipated impact of the proposed project;
- 3. The applicant's past experience with the targeted Baltimore community;
- 4. Why the proposed work is important to the applicant and to the community;
- 5. How the applicant will accomplish the goals of the project; and
- 6. How the project will stimulate social change.

III. APPLICANT'S RESUME

Please submit your resume or CV.

Farring Elementary School, and Benjamin Franklin High School) to develop Teaching Students to Make a Dent. The organization will teach design thinking, community engagement and entrepreneurship to instill students with the skills and mindset essential to becoming innovators of change.

In partnership with Growing Soul, Inc., Matthew Burke will establish Baltimore Free Farm Food Rescue, a network of food give-away sites at local businesses, churches and community centers for the purpose of providing nutritious food, reducing waste and educating the public on issues related to food justice.
